### Meeting Location Change for April XA5T ARRL DX Contest

This month's meeting topic will be the XA5T ARRL DX Contest that was operated by several NARS members in both CW and SSB. Both teams are currnetly in second place.

This will be a joint meeting between NARS and Texas DX Society. Many of both teams are TDXS members. TDXS has been operating and maintaining the XA5T station for many years.

The location for this special monthly meeting for NARS has changed location for April only. We will be meeting at the Spring Branch ISD Career Center, Instructional Television Department at 10670 Hammerly. This building is located 1 block East of the Sam Houston Tollway on Hammerly. If you are coming South from the 290 area, take the Tollway South to the Hammerly exit. Turn left under the Tollway and left into the first driveway past the Texaco–Burger King. The building to your right will be the SBISD Career Center. Take the driveway to the Northwest corner of the building. There is a satellite dish behind a chain link fence in the front of the building and several more satellites on the roof plus a 200' self supporting tower in the back. There is also a 70' tower on the roof of the building.

The outside door will have the address 10670 over it. We will be meeting in the theater. It's the first door on the left as you enter the building.

If you are coming from I–10 go North on the Tollway, take the Hammerly exit and right on Hammerly and left into the driveway past the Texaco–Burger King.

Backup equipment, FT-890, Clipperton amp and NEC Lap top

## **DX News** "For All the NARS DX News Fit to Print"

In like a lamb and out like a lion pretty well describes the solar activity for March 2001. The month opened quietly posting a solar flux of 131, an A index of 7, and a K index of 3. The month closed with a solar flux of 246, an A index of 131, and a K index of 2. In between there really wasn't much to foretell the month's incredible end. On the 8th we reached an interim peak of 177 then the activity started a slow downward drift to 136 on the 16th. One final remaining peak occurred on the 23rd. at 183.

Then our solar britches got blown off on the 28th when the SFI jumped to 274. Just prior to this, the A index was slowly rising through the low to mid–20's. As the geomagnetic cloud hit the earth on the 31st., the A index jumped to 140! These events are hard to believe, but exciting to experience.

Of course as Murphy would have it, this all happened just as Paul W5PF and Dee W1HEO were opening up for some DX R & R from J3 Grenada.

Overall, the increased activity has provided some great band conditions on 80 through 10 meters, or at least until mother earth was engulfed in the geomagnetic cloud. 10, 15 and 20 meters had really been delivering some good DX up until that point. It seems that with the string of cooler lows moving down out of the Colorado Rockies, our winter has stretched into a very mild early spring meaning that 40 and 75 meter DX has been good.

Finally, interesting news from Tad Cook - K7VVV via W1AW, Tad says, "it now seems that Cycle 23 did not peak and begin declining in 2000 after all." Tad also reports, "the peak solar flux values in 2000 were 262 on May 17 and 261.9 also reports that on July 18, but this week, on March 26, a growing region 9393 produced a new high for Cycle 23 of 263.7 and the next two days produced even higher solar flux numbers of 273.4 and 273.5! (The highest recorded solar flux for the week actually was at 2300 UTC on Wednesday, at 293.8-a magnitude not seen since 1992-but the official daily number is always taken at 2000 UTC.)"

### Local Events:

Looks like the good DX conditions from the first of the year are beginning to pay off. Steve – N5EN is walking pretty tall after receiving new QSL cards for VK0MM Macquarie Is., YK9A Syria, and C91RF Mozambique. Now for the best part, Steve has several new ones including Spratly 9M0M on 10 SSB, 15 SSB and CW; Pratas BQ9P on 10 CW, and Lord Howe Is. VK9EHH on 20 SSB. I'll tell you, Steve just keeps pushing beyond the 300 mark. Congratulations! I hope more of us make it.

Paul W5PF has been pretty busy preparing for the J3 Grenada trip and making the trip to XA5T. Paul also found time to work a little DX including H40RW Temotu on 15 CW, BQ9P Pratas Is. on 10 SSB & CW, 3G0Y Easter Is. on several bands on SSB and CW. The mailman was also kind to Paul dropping off QSL cards from the HV0A the Vatican, TI9C Cocos Is., VK0MM Macquarie Is., and S21YJ Bangladesh for numbers 299 and 300. Congratulations, Paul that 300 mark seems to be a real challenge!

If you had to make three nice DX contacts, you might choose the three Walter KK5LO reports. Walter started out with Egypt SU9ZZ on the 1st., Niue Is. ZK2BQI on the 9th., and Tajikistan EY8MM on the 14th.

Bruce N1LN says March was pretty good. In between his two-steppin' Bruce added some OSOs towards his 5BDXCC. Check this out: on 160 meters he worked KG4IZ - Guantanamo Bay and 3G0Y - Easter Is. on CW; on 80 meters he snagged TE8AA - Costa Rica on SSB, BQ9P - Pratas Is. and T32RD -East Kiribati on CW; on 40 meters FR5FD – Reunion Is. and 5U3T – Niger on CW; on 15 meters 5U2K - Niger on SSB and H40RW – Temotu CW; on 12 meters our old friend Claudio Vascotto ET3VSC - Ethiopia. And to round things out TR8CX – Gabon is in Bruce's log on 15 SSB. Way to go OM, that's busy.

Cal WF5W reported earlier this month on the Monday night net that he was in serious negotiations with his mail carrier. From his report, it looks like he was very persuasive with new QSLs in the file from YI9OM Iraq; ZM8CW Kermadec Is.; YK9A Syria; XT2OW Burkina Faso (formerly Upper Volta); and SU9ZZ Egypt. George K5VUU had a heck–of–a–month working new counties and dragging more new cards in than anyone. Seven, count' um seven new countries confirmed. K5VUU logs show new countries of: HV5NAC the Vatican on 10 meters SSB; 3W2LWS Vietnam on 15 meters CW; and 5W0DA Western Samoa on 10 meters SSB!

George also worked the Falkland Is. VP8DCD on 20 meters SSB hoping that this time the card comes through. New cards include: 3W2LWS Vietnam, JT1CC Mongolia, SV9CVY Crete, UK8GH Uzbekistan, VK0MM Macquarie Is., VP2E Anguilla, and JD1BCK Minami Torishima. This brings George's count to 281 worked, and 265 confirmed. Outstanding operating, Congrats!

John W5PDW also reports a good month. John reports working the XA5T group on 80 through 10 meters plus the radio arial on his Ford Econoline. (John that 10 meter QSO was tuff!) In addition, John's log contains the following: 5W0DA Western Samoa at 2242 hrs on 28.393, 9M0M Spratly Is. at 1524 hrs on 14.260, 3G0Y Easter Is. on both 21 and 28 MHZ, FOOARE Clipperton Is. at 0342 on 14.254, 4K8M Azerbaijan at 0421 hrs on 14.246. Further the breakdown looks like this: 39 Qs on 10 meters, 20 Qs on 15 meters, 25 Qs on 20 meters, 32 Qs on 40 meters, and 19 on 75 meters. It would be interesting to know how your logs breakdown. Over a period of time with several reporting, maybe we could chart or relate the number of Qs by band to establish a trend that would tell us what propagation was generally like in our area.

On second thought, nope, too hard!

I added two new countries to the "worked" list: 5U2K Niger and C91CU Mozambique.

Best of all were the new cards that arrived. New country confirmations arrived for: ER1IM Moldova and EZ6DK Turkmenistan. Yes, of course the Moldova card arrived via the buro only after I had just sent out 6 in direct mail! I'm hoping to team up with John W5PDW to watch a few extra mailboxes during April.
