What is the Capture Effect

One of the most notable differences between an amplitude modulated (AM) receiver and a frequency modulated (FM) receiver is how noise and interference affect an incoming signal.

From the time of the first spark transmitter "rotten QRM" has been a major problem for amateurs. The limiter and discriminator stages in an FM receiver can eliminate most of the impulse type noise, except any noise that has frequency modulation characteristic. For good noise suppression the receiver IF system and detector phase tuning must be accurately aligned.

FM receivers perform quite differently from AM, PSSBB and CW receivers when QRM is present, exhibiting characteristic known as the "capture effect". The loudest signal received, even it is only two or three times stronger than other signals on the frequency, will be only demodulated. On the other hand, an S9 AM, SSB or CW signal suffers noticeable interference from an S2 signal. Capture effect can be an advantage if you are trying to receive a strong station and there are weaker stations on the same frequency. At the same time, phenomenon will prevent you from receiving on the weaker signals if that is your desire.

DX News "For All the NARS DX News Fit to Print"

Rare DX returned to Texas and the rest of the world this month after a seemingly long dry spell. And a number of the NARS bunch logged VP8THU on South Sandwich Is. and VP8GEO on South Georgia Is., South Atlantic for new ones including this Op. Congratulations to all (including certain DX hogs, not mentioned by call, but by call area 1).

The January numbers were good and by-in-large the bands were also in good shape.

* The high SFI occurred January 29th with a reading of 261 down slightly over December.

* The low SFI occurred on January 8th with a reading of 189 down from December.

* The low A index occurred on January 19th with a reading of 1.* The high A index occurred on January 11th with a reading of 19.

* The low K index occurred on January 4th with a reading of 0.* The high K index occurred on January 19th with a reading of 5.

The SFI was over 200 for 27 of the 31 days in January. Not bad! It begs the question posed last year, where are we in this current 11 year sunspot cycle?

Local Events:

Mike K5NZ reports logging the S. Sandwich Is. VP8THU on 40 CW on the 21st. for number 327. Mike also received his EY8CQ card for number 300 confirmed.

John W5PDW says the S. Sandwich Is. boys DID NOT find their way into his log, although he listened and could easily hear the South Pole group 5–7 +. John did bag 9U5D Brunei on the 2nd, with the card returning on the 16th. (Don't tell Matt KD5LOA the card returned so quickly). He also received cards for Laos XW0X, Cocos Keeling VK9C, Turkmenistan EZ3A, and British Cyprus ZC4, Five cards in one month! On top of this, John worked the S. Georgia Is. VP8GEO! After reporting this, John's note was a little fuzzy mentioning something about pouring fried okra down his tower base to the DX Gods...

Cal WF5W was back perking again on the bands in January working S. Sandwich Is. on 20 meter CW (after an hour and 44 minutes) for number 321! Cal was quick to thank his son–in–law for getting the station back on the air after a lightening scare. Cal says that Straight Key night was a success where he worked a few old timers using QRP.

Paul W5PF says January was slim pickens, although he did log S. Sandwich Is. VP8THU on 20 cw. Other DX logged included TG, TI, and HR on 6 meters. The last country for which Paul had a QSL outstanding was Trinidad Is. PT0T. The card did arrive for number 311.

Bruce N1LN/5 worked the DXpedition boys to the South Atlantic as follows: S. Sandwich Is. VP8THU n 40, 20, 17, 15, 12 SSB and on 17 meter CW. AND, he logged the S. Georgia Is. VP8GEO boys like this: 20 SSB/CW, 15 CW, 17 SSB, and 80 meter CW mode.

Jim KJ5X says that January was kinda a slow month having been rung out with the flu and other things. Jim did log Burundi 9U5D on 10M SSB, LZ1ANA on 40M CW, and S. Sandwich VP8THU on 20 CW and S. Georgia VP8GEO Islands on 20M SSB/CW and 40 meter CW. Jim says these are the first new ones since May 6 of last year. That lifted the old DX spirits a bunch. I was beginning to think I had lost my touch.

Steve N5EN logged the S. Sandwich group on 20 and 40 meters and S. Georgia on 15 and 20. Steve says that the S. Sandwich Is. was a new one and that he still waiting on the QSL card from his previous S. Georgia Is. contact of (11/27/01).

Jim K5JDB reports 53 DX contacts in December and 56 DX contacts in January. Most impressive (to him) were V51AS, NAMIBIA; EY8CQ, TAJECKISTAN: T77M, SAN 7X2LS, ALGERIA; MARINO; GHANA; 9G1PD, 5X1GS, UGANDA: D54PAH. SOUTH KOREA: A35VK. TONGA: 4W6MM, EAST TIMOR, AND KC4AAA. FROM THE SOUTH POLE. Got qsl card from 5R8ET, MADAGASCAR and that was from a November contact. What fun!!!

Terry KQ5U says January activity was rather low. However some DX was worked QRP 5W. Those of note were A35VK (15M & 10M); OD5/OK1MO (1ØM); 3D2AG/P, Rotuma (1ØM); DU7/N7ET (1ØM); 7X4AN (1ØM&4ØM); VP8GEO (3ØM). Terry received cards for QRP contacts from D44CF, VK9CQ, T32Z and FM5GU.

The station received WAS–2xQRP (both stations at QRP power) from ARCI. Of course, DE was the last state worked and WV was the previous state worked. This was quite a challenge as Terry was able to work DXCC QRP in half the time it took him to work WAS–2xQRP.

Put the K2 on 16ØM with a G5RV at 35 feet and tried it out on the band for a total of about a dozen contacts. Terry reports the greatest distance at 5W was W8JI in Georgia. It looks like 16ØM is an area in which the station could be improved.

Countries include: 6W, 9K, A3, C6, CX, DL, EA6, EA8, F, G, HL, JA, JW, KC4, KH4, KH5, KL7, LU, OD, OZ, P4, PY, SV, V5, VE, VP5, VP8G, VP8S, VU, XE, and ZD7. I think the best catches were the VP8S on South Sandwich Is., and VP8G on South Georgia Is. New ones for sure! I always get a little nervous: however, when that don't repeat your whole call in one breath! I tried. I can only hope.

Here are the IOTAs worked: AF004, AF022, AN016, AS076, EU004, EU005, EU026, NA002, NA111, OC030, OC049, OC085, SA002, and SA036.

The new Heil (mini) headset arrived along with the latest Flying Horse CD. The headset will sure make this year's TQP easier!

New cards in this month confirm Italy on 40 meters, Mexico on 80 meters, and England on 80 meters.

A very special thanks goes to Mike K7LEX for his reply QSL for last year's TQP confirming four Texas counties, which he cleverly printed on his card. I, on the other hand, was not successful in getting counties to print through DX4Win on my cards. Sounds like more work. You all may recall that Mike K7LEX and Bruce N1LN are big county hunters!

Last but not least, I received a card from my old friend Sam – WA5RPP who lives in the upper part of Maine, Aroostock county. Potato country!
