Forgotten Cookies

Preheat oven to 450 degrees
5–6 egg whites (room temperature)
1/2 cup sugar
1 tsp vanilla
Whip egg whites to firm peaks (but not dry). Gradually add sugar during last 2 minutes of whipping. Fold in Vanilla when the eggs whites are completely whipped.

Fold in a 12-ounce package of semisweet chocolate chips and 1 cup of coarsely chopped pecans. Drop by tablespoons onto two cookie sheets covered with non-stick aluminum foil. Place cookie sheets in the hot oven and turn oven OFF. Leave the cookie sheets in the oven over night. Do not open the door until the next morning. Cookies will be light brown and crisp on the outside but soft and chewy on the inside. Enjoy!

QUA* Mike Bragassa K5UO?

OK, name the most unusual place you have ever been and my latest interviewee has probably been there – well, maybe not Yap! Just ask K5UO, Mike Bragassa, about your favorite place and if he hasn't lived there, he has probably been through at some time in his life. He has lived in nine states and had projects in 19 or 20 countries!

Mike started life in Tulsa, Oklahoma; you're thinking – that doesn't sound too exciting, right? But, when I asked him how long he lived there he said his parents were just visiting, they lived in Alberta! So, here we go. . .

His father was an oil drilling contractor and they moved to where the work was located. Mike met Sharon in Evanston, Illinois. In 1961 he was fresh out of The University of Wyoming at Casper with his Petroleum Engineering degree. He went to work at an oil and gas bank where she worked. They were there for two years.

Sharon has stayed settled in the States to keep continuity to their family life. They have three children who remained located where they were to attend college. Their oldest son is living in Michigan, after college at Mt. Pleasant. Their daughter went to Mike's Alma mater and now teaches school in Denver and their youngest son lives in Idaho after also graduating from the University of Wyoming.

Mike and Sharon have a cocker spaniel named Mandy who is one of several that kept her company on his long trips.

The company Mike worked for started out as one of the Hughes Tool group of companies and became Hughes Christiansen, then merged as Hughes Baker. He established offices for exploration in foreign countries. He has recently retired and is glad to be staying in one place.

Mike spent the last 12 years of his career based in Moscow. This was his most rewarding position because he went into the country alone and twelve years later turned over a company with ten engineers, several clerks and some ex-patriots (people from other countries working in Russia).

The company he was creating in Moscow covered from the Pacific Ocean to the Baltic States and he spent much of the time traveling this territory. They traveled between the "stans" Pakistan, Uzbekistan, etc, usually aboard Aeroflot. It was often exciting. When a Republic would declare independence they would "claim" aircraft on the ground and getting back to Moscow would be a challenge.

One of the frustrating things about amateur radio from Moscow was that somebody kept taking his antenna. He replaced it a couple of times, but finally gave up, especially since he was traveling a large part of the time and it was too much work to maintain the equipment in his limited free-time.

Working in China was very different from most because he was always accompanied by an interpreter provided by the government to

monitor his activities. Therefore he had less reason to learn the language. He could speak enough to hold conversations, but reading it was impossible. He once fell asleep on a train while traveling from one province to another. The crew had been requested to wake him up. When they didn't he got off at the wrong station and they ran him down and put him on another train to the correct station.

Mike used to go to the local radio club to make contacts while in Beijing. He used the call BY1QH. He had over 1,000 QSOs while in China.

The office was on the street that ran through Tiananmen Square. When the events happened in 1989 the government cut all phone, fax and other methods of communication. He was on the radio and received a call from a person with a British accent. They were pressing him about what was happening. He responded that he should not discuss politics on the radio. When the person persisted he shut it down. He believes it was a reporter from Hong Kong trying to get information.

He left the nationals to run the office and found a room at the Holiday Inn a block from the airport. He left the next day, but was invited back six weeks later by the Chinese government. They wanted to keep good relationships with the rest of the world.

When Mike was living in Egypt he operated from an off-shore rig as maritime-mobile. He called CQ and was answered by N5DC, Jim lane from Kingwood. He wanted Mike to compare his signal with his friend, K5XX in Palestine, TX. Jim, said, "You won't like the answer, but his signal is 20 DB better!"

He talked regularly with his QSL manager, K8BK. He would hear him and say 10 up through the pile-up. They would then talk for a while and were finished one evening when an old-timer responded saying he didn't believe Mike was in China. His reasoning – he spoke perfect English! He then listened a while longer and finally contacted him again to say that yes, he did believe him after listening.

Mike was first licensed at 13 with the call, WM9BNL. His called changed every time he moved, which was often. He upgraded to extra about 20 years ago. 90% of his contacts are CW and he is beginning to get his speed up again after 12 years of little use.

I was not prepared for the response when I asked about his equipment, so, here are my notes.

Towers:
Two 75 feet, 105 feet

Antennas:
3 element KLM 40 meters
WARC Cushcraft A3WS
Tennadyne T-12 12 element log periodic, all band
1/2 wave vertical wire 80 meters

Inverted "L" 160 meters
2 Beverages 160, 80

He has just installed all new coax and would like to put up a 30 meter antenna.

I couldn't find any notes about his radios, so I guess you will just have to ask him – my eyes are crossed just keeping up!

He has received the ARRL DXCC and earned 1 honor roll award.

Mike has 333 of the current countries and 346 total, counting deletions (which become important when you get to these numbers!)

Since he received the honor roll they have added 15 and 20 meters. He currently has five bands and 600 QSL cards which he needs to submit, of which 500 are 15/20 meters. He will then have a nine band deck!

One of Mike's other hobbies is collecting the Russian Czar bank notes. He brought many back from his trips and is now enjoying selling them on E-bay. He is finding that most of the people buying them are immigrants from Russia and they are thrilled to have them. He has found that it is almost impossible to ship them through the Russian mail because they never make it to their destination.

I was very interested in how Mike would answer my favorite question about summing up his life. He responded, "Traveling man enjoyed it but traveled out, suitcases for sale." Well, Mike, I hope if our group decides to do any world traveling together you will pick-up those suitcases, bring Sharon and give us the tour of our lives!

The three of us, Cal –WF5W, Mike – K5UO, and me, were all on 2 mtr simplex keeping track of each other while chasing 80 mtr CW DX. One of us would spot a DX station calling CQ – that person would announce it on 2 mtrs and we would all converge. The calling would start until we all had a good Q and then move on to the next station. We didn't work anything new but we did have a great time, checked out our low band RX and TX antennas and worked HA, LZ, YU, EA, YU, DL, OM and perhaps a few more.

H.O., has a great report for January, Hey I thought you were sick? Check out those credentials at the bottom of his report. Next thing we know he will be appointed as the Grand Puma of the Planet Xylophone. Glad you are feeling better.

Winter has been good this year at the K5CX teepee especially on the low bands where I needed about 18 countries on 80 meters to complete my 5BDXCC. Well, that is if I get the cards out and into the mail. In any event, I have 5 more to go using my inverted vee and no special receive antennas which I dearly wish I had!

57 DX countries found their way into the K5CX log. 20 countries in January alone were worked on 80-meters, and 3 countries on 40-meters. Here are the 80-meter countries: 9Z4GB-Trinidad & Tobago, CT1DVV-Portugal, DL6SN-Fed. Rep. of Germany, EI6S – Ireland, ER1QQ-Moldovia, HF75PZK – Poland, HQ2DMR – Honduras, KG4SB – Guantanamo Bay, OK2RZ-Czech Republic, ON4AEK – Belgium, P49MR – Aruba, PZ5RA – Surinam, T91S-Bosnia – Herzegovina, TG9NX – Guatemala, TR8CA – Gabon, V31LZ – Belize, XFIK – Mexico, YS1/HB9KNA – El Salvador, YU1AAV – Yugoslavia, and YV4GD – Venezuela.

The 40-meter countries included: I4LEC – Italy, KG4SB – Guantanamo Bay, and S9SS-Sao Tome & Principe.

Rounding out the month were 9 countries on 20-meters, 7 on 17, 7 on 15, 6 on 12, and 5 countries on 10-meters.

It's just possible I may get the last 5 countries worked on 80-meters this winter. WooHoo! 73 good DX to all.

Highlights from the NARS Board Meeting

The regular monthly NARS board meeting was held on January 25 at our new location, the Ponderosa Firehouse on Rolling Creek Drive. The following board members were in attendance: Lee Kinard, Joe Sokolowski, Jerry Whiting, Mike Lodge, Cal White, Mark Tyler, Paul Frantz and Chuck Sanders along with the following guests: Bill Stietenroth, and Paul Flagg. Highlights of the meeting:

• **VE Sessions** – It was reported that the VE session sponsored by the club on January 22, 2005 tested thirteen candidates, who took a total of nineteen elements. Two of the candidates took Element One and both passed. Nine of candidates took the Element Two exam and all passed. Four candidates took Element Three and all passed. The results produced nine new Technicians, and four new Generals. Kudos to all who took the exam elements and to the club members who participated as VEs.
