Your Radio Skills Are Needed

The Polaris District of the Boy Scouts of America put on an emergency preparedness round table here in northwest Harris County in June. Bill Rimmer, N5LYG, ARES District 14 Emergency Coordinator asked for volunteers to staff an Amateur Radio demonstration table at the event. NARS public service volunteers stepped up and put on a good display. Jerry Whiting, KB5VGD, Bill Skipper, KB5BS, Terry Myers, KQ5U, John Buoy, (Bill's little brother) K5JKB, Bill Rimmer, and I brought radios and literature and stirred up some interest from many of the attendees.

The county wide hurricane drill held on June 6Th was not supposed to include a communications failure that required an Amateur Radio response but ARES jumped in anyway and activated some key emergency response sites. Transtar and Houston E.O.C were activated as well as numerous hospitals and other county agencies. NARS members were active at Northwest Medical Center and Methodist Willowbrook Hospital. Terry, KQ5U, Jerry, KB5VGD, Mark, AD5YV were at Northwest Med Center. Tom, KD5EIJ, Bill, KB5BS, Ron, W5RFI and I were at Methodist Willowbrook Hosp. We established direct VHF contacts both voice and digital between these hospitals, Harris County and Houston E.O.C.'s and E.O.C.'s in surrounding counties. It is important to have direct contact in an emergency because repeaters may be down. Ms. Lollie Garay -KD5WZM has up graded to General class. She has applied for a club call for the LABRATS Radio club and the new call is W5LAB. The Students are looking forward to making contacts this fall with their new call. We have six or seven students that will continue from last year and we usually get a few new members after school starts.

Ms. Lollie has been accepted for an international expedition to Antarctica aboard the Icebreaker *Oden*. This expedition will start November 25, 2007 though January 9, 2008. Lollie Garay will journey across the world to participate in a unique co-operative endeavor between the Swedish Polar Research Secretariat and the U.S. National Science Foundation (NSF).

Along with researchers, teachers and other personnel from Sweden, and the United States, Ms. Garay will board the Swedish icebreaker *Oden* in Punta Arenas, Chile and travel to McMurdo Base in Antarctica, finally returning home via Christchurch, New Zealand.

The scientific objectives of the cruise are to collect a range of data in rarely traveled areas of the Antarctic seas and coastline, including the Bellingshausen, Amundsen, and eastern Ross Seas. An international research team will be studying the oceanography and biogeochemistry of the region while in transit to Antarctica. These studies will add to our limited knowledge of these remote corners of the Antarctic Seas and allow future researchers to expand their monitoring efforts in these regions.

Lollie teaches Earth and Space Science at Redd School in Houston, Texas, and

holds a Master of Science Teaching degree from Rice University. Her mission in teaching is to get students excited about science through active, real-time learning. She develops Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM) programs for families, and students, teachers including after-school programs Robotics, Engineering, Aeronautics, and Amateur Radio. Ms. Garay works with the American Institute of Aeronautics and Astronautics Pre-College program, various NASA Science committees, is a Fellow with Baylor College of Medicine and the NASA MESSENGER Mission programs, and was a JASON Project XVII Teacher Argo. Ms. Garay believes polar education and public outreach are integral to creating change developing environmental stewardship, and will use her expedition on the Oden to bring the science into the classroom.

Sunday, July 15th brought on the Katy Flatland Century bike ride. This ride covers four courses ranging from 33

miles to 100 miles and takes about 15 hams to cover the course that runs from Katy Mills Mall up toward Waller back to Bellville down near Sealy to Frydek to Wallis to Simonton to Brookshire to Fulshear and back to Katy Mills Mall. We used the W5BSA repeater that was recently upgraded by Haskel, W5HLM. It did a good job of covering the whole area. There were two ambulances and two first responder units covering the course along with 9 rest stops. All needed Ham radio communications. NARS members working that event included, Paul Owen, N5NXS, and his daughter Sarah, Jeff Walter, KE5FGA, Peter Wang, KF5ND, and Bill, K5ZTY. The net control operator was 17 year old Josh, KE5FGC, who is Paul's assistant net control of the Houston Marathon. Josh is getting good at handling a busy net.

Texas QSO Party 2007

Holy jalapeno NARSians the last few days have been hotter than a Texas chili cook-off. But I recall a couple of days a month or so ago when we had a little cool front come through. It was only a teaser of things to come but it reminded me that in only a few months fall will be here and, along with fall, a radio operating event that many operators in the club, as well as across Texas and the country look forward to each year. Of course I'm referring to the Texas QSO Party which is always the last full weekend in September. This year that means September 29-30. It's a two-day event starting at 0900 CDT on Saturday and breaking for the evening at 2100 CDT. Then it picks up again at 0900 CDT on Sunday and runs until 1500 CDT.

In case you're a new ham or have not operated the TQP in the past, the name of the event says it all.

- operators and antennas across the globe are focused on Texas with the objective of contacting and exchanging information with as many Texas stations in as many different counties as possible. In 2006 there were a total of approximately 175 logs turned in containing a total of about 40,000 QSOs with 233 of the 254 Texas counties represented.
- QSO valid contacts must at least include the two-way exchange of a signal report and a QTH but if you run into an ex-pat NARSian like N1LN (aka NC4KW) or a Walter of Hockenstein or just an old friend you're also encouraged to exchange a Texas howdy or a "how you been" before moving on to the next contact.

Party - like all good parties the TQP is intended to be a fun event. Some folks think of it as a contest and go all out to try to win a new piece of lumber or wallpaper for the shack wall or to do better than their buddy across town, or to make some large number of contacts from a large number of counties. Others combine it with a camping or fishing trip taking their gear on the road to see what its like to operate from another county. When things get slow or the spirit moves them these folks have also been known to drop a line in the local river or the Gulf of Mexico. Others just see the TQP as a good excuse to take a nice road trip through Texas covering some rare Texas counties while testing out their mobile gear and their ability to handle pileups as they change county lines.

Whatever your orientation, regardless of the time you can commit to operating the TQP, you'll find it to be a fun event. For those that are looking for more lumber for the shack wall we've got plaque sponsors for all of the first place finishers in each of the categories both inside and outside of Texas. We also have sponsors for a number of the second and third place plaques but could use a few more sponsors in these areas. If you are interested in sponsoring a second or third place plaque you can do so for only \$14.50. Contact the TQP Coordinator if you are interested. It's a good way to publicize the fact that you're an active radio operator.

Some of the most fun that can be experienced in the TQP is to operate as a mobile. Last year we had a total of thirty operators involved in mobile operations. If you're planning to operate mobile it's time to check out

your gear, get yourself a driver, get out the map, plan your route and then let everyone know of your plans by posting them on the website www.txqp.org. It is also a good idea to post your plan on the county hunter's website www.countyhunter.com.

Most of the activity in the TQP is on HF but that shouldn't deter you from getting involved even if you don't currently have HF capability at your QTH. Check around to see if other members in the club might need another operator to help out in their multi-op or see if a mobile operator might be looking for a driver/ co-operator.

So mark your calendars and make your plans now to participate in the 2007 Texas QSO Party. Consult the website www.txqp.org for additional details about the TQP and if you have questions please contact any of the TQP Committee members listed on the site.

Do the TQP in 2007 and show the world that ham radio is alive and well in Texas.

The FCC once again made clear that Part 97 "does not prohibit Amateur Radio operators who are emergency personnel engaged in disaster relief from using their amateur radio bands while in a paid duty status." This changed this past December in WT Docket 04-140, the "Omnibus" Amateur Radio Report and Order (R&O).

Feedback ARES QSO Party Proposal

I presented your ARES HF QSO Party question to the South Texas section ARES Yahoo group via a one week poll. That group has 215 members, 36 of which answered the poll (17%). The poll question and results follow:

Would you support an ARES HF QSO Party over a weekend where operators would exchange call sign, signal report, county, section or state, and their ARES or emcomm titles?

NO - 6 - 16%

YES - 30 - 83%

I strongly recommend adopting the NA QSO Party contest format. Only two entry classes in that; single operator and

multi-operator/two-transmitter, except no teams in this new contest, and maybe not the multi-two either. The NA QP are mode-specific with separate weekends for SSB, CW and RTTY; we need not do such, but allow all modes on the same

weekend. To me, the best parts of this format are that everyone is limited to 100 watts, and it is a 10-12 hour contest starting at noon Saturday. Perhaps different points could be awarded depending upon the person's appointment that you work; 1 point for ARES "member," 2 for AEC, 3 for EC/ RO, 4 for DEC/DRO, etc. 1 point for SSB, 2 for CW or RTTY. From the ARRL Letter:

ARRL Board of Directors Acts on Background Checks, Digital Issues at July Board Meeting.

A major concern at this Board meeting was the topic of served agencies and background investigations. The Ad Hoc Background Investigation Committee that pursuing agreed federally recognized credentialing for Amateur Radio volunteers was critical for the Amateur Radio Emergency Service (ARES) to function. The Committee chairman, ARRL Atlantic Division Director Bill Edgar, N3LLR, proposed that the Board adopt a policy with regard to Memoranda of Understanding with the various served agencies.

The Board adopted a policy that "communications volunteers participating ARRL-sponsored in programs should not be required by served agencies to undergo background investigations of any kind," but notes criminal that background checks--performed by law enforcement agencies--are "generally acceptable." The policy continues, "It is not reasonable for a served agency to require these volunteers to consent to credit checks, mode of living investigations or investigative consumer reports. In negotiating or renegotiating Memoranda of Understanding that commit the League to provide volunteer emergency communications support, the League must be assured that these volunteers will not be required by the partner organization to consent to credit checks, mode of living investigations or investigative consumer reports."
