

QUA* Dick Rooney W5VHN?

Until my latest conversation with a NARS member I thought my dad was involved at the very beginning of computers, in the mid–50's (before I was born, in case you were calculating!) But, I just talked with W5VHN and he was in the really early stages in the late 40's. And he has some fun stories. Dick Rooney, his friends call him "Doc", may be NARS' oldest member at 84. I'm sure if I have misstated someone will let me know – here's his story.

Dick was born in Lynn, Mass. His family then settled in Malden, Mass., north of Boston, Where he graduated from high school. While living in the New England area he taught snow skiing and was even involved with a team from Austria teaching a new method of parallel called Arlburg, which rivaled the Swiss methods. The team was used to teach a troop of skiers during the war.

Speaking of methods, his grandfather was a professor and developed a method of penmanship which challenged Gregg. He concedes that Gregg won, because we have never heard of his grandfather.

Dick, he doesn't become "Doc" for a few more years, then joined the Navy. He was lying on the beach in Key West, Florida when war was declared. He went to sea where for starters he saw the Missouri get hit by Kamikaze pilots.

His boat was an LFT which was for communications and sat low in the water. There was a new technology, called fire controlled radar, being tested on a neighboring ship. The machine gun would follow the Kamikaze, but it sighted his ship and swept the deck. One of Dick's friends was hit and he was as mad as a hornet because he was hit by friendly fire. This friend was an Electrician's Mate and created an electro magnet to pull the shrapnel out of the wounded.

Dick was chief radioman and had a team of 40 working during a typhoon. Some were very sea–sick. Dick asked an especially bad case if he wanted to leave. He croaked "No," then threw up again in his helmet and kept going.

Dick served for six years and then left to attend Georgia Tech, where he received a degree in Electrical Engineering. There he met his wife of 56 years, at a dance. Her name is Anne. They both love gardening, she concentrates on roses.

Together they had three girls and one boy and now have five grandchildren and even two great–grand–children. Three of their children live in the Houston area. One daughter remained in Tennessee.

"Doc", received his PhD in Business at American University in Washington, D.C and began his professional career. He worked for several years with the government in Washington, D.C. and various locations around New England.

One of his favorite stories is about a computer "storage" system consisting of six 25 foot mercury filled tubes with cylinders at each end. The signal would be sent through the mercury.

Another problem was the reel-to-reel tapes. They moved so fast that when they stopped to reverse directions they would break. So they tried a tube with air flow to dampen the effect. It didn't work very well

At one point his delay was a roll of coax! And one time he flew to Sylvania's plant to test each Dipole for its front to back ratio because they needed it to be very high.

Doc left his government position and worked with ITT in New Jersey and then from there back to Georgia where he was Director of Science and Technology Commission of Georgia. His initial responsibility was to win the bid for a facility to be built in Georgia. In this endeavor he met Hubert Humphrey during Governor Maddox's term to present his proposal. The site was put in Miami, but their group was one of the first "space technology" use commercial endeavors.

He went from there to Lockheed in Atlanta and was involved with the design of the C5A. They used a computer program to design the plane; what happens if you change the wing, make the tail larger, etc. When the bottom fell out of the aeronautics industry Lockheed from approximately 35,000 went employees to 5,000 in one week. Doc was one of the casualties. He then accepted a professorship at Emory University and from there to the University of Tennessee at Chattanooga. For five years he taught the MBA program to Nuclear Engineers who were unemployed.

His final move was to the University of Houston to become the Chairman of their newly established Business Program. He retired from this position in 1986.

When I asked W5VHN about his radio equipment he said, "It's old.", but it must still work well because he has "somewhere around" 340 countries. And, can anyone match this? Satellite DXCC confirmed about three or four years ago! His one disappointment is that as he was moving around the country and changing call signs (he's had one in all!), he threw away the QSL cards.)

Oh, yeah, the equipment; an ICOM and a 34 foot tower in the front yard (there are too many power lines in the back), with a tri-bander and all the necessary satellite gear.

He has made so many contacts that few standout as special, but he talked many times on voice, CW and satellite with a ham in Japan who always says for instance, "This is the 18th time we have talked". He has his picture climbing his tower

His son has his license with the call KC5VHN, purely by the luck of the draw! It kept W5VHN from getting one of those vanity calls. He qualified to do so when he became an Extra the "old" way testing at better than 20 wpm. In fact Doc has his First Class Commercial license and also a First Class Telephone/Telegraph license received in Honolulu around 1943. The only way to get this is if you have served at least one year at sea.

"Doc" and Anne have been involved in the community in various ways over the years since retirement began. Enough that the North Spring area in which they live named a park after him, "Doc" Rooney Community Park. Franny and I will have to have Michael take us over for a visit!

When I asked him to sum up his life he said he "wouldn't change a damn thing. I had a good education and career, wonderful family and friends." "Doc", we can only hope that when we are 84 we will be able to say the same.
