The ARRL DXCC Desk has approved these operations for DXCC credit: 4S7NZG — Sri Lanka (renewal), 2013 operation; XW4XR — Laos, current operation; Z8ØID — South Sudan, special Jul 9, 2013, operation for Independence Day celebration; 9M4SLL — Spratly Islands, 2012-2013 operations; 9Q6CC — Democratic People's Republic of the Congo, 2010-2011 operation; XWØYJY — Laos, 2013 operation; 9XØEME — Rwanda, 2013 operation; 6OØLA — Somalia, 2013 operation, and T6JM — Afghanistan, 2012 operation. — ARRL Awards Branch Manager Bill Moore, NC1L

The Amsterdam Island DXpedition team has made "significant progress" in the past couple of months in preparation for its January 2014 DXpedition, the team reported in a news release July 27.

Located in the middle of the Indian Ocean, Amsterdam and St Paul Islands is the seventh most-wanted DXCC entity, according to Clublog. The news release says the team has begun receiving supplies and equipment at its Atlanta staging area, with antennas expected to arrive in the next few weeks. Computer and networking plans are underway, and a terrain analysis has been completed. The team reports it has prepared more than 10,000 feet of radials for low-band antennas, and plans for several low-band receiving systems are also complete.

"Our team will become a real part of the small community on Amsterdam Island," the DXpedition's news release says. The team remains shy of its fundraising goal. "At this time we are about two-thirds of the way to our goal," the team announced. "This is of some concern." More information on the Amsterdam Island DXpedition budget and other information is available on the Amsterdam Island FT5DX website.

The Swaziland 3DA0ET DXpedition is scheduled to run from Monday 18 November to Wednesday 27 November 2013. It is

a multi-national team comprising Canadian, American, German and South African operators, several of whom have prior DXpedition experience covering all operating modes.

They'll be running 4 stations, covering all the HF bands (160 to 10 meters) and 6 meters if they spot any openings, on CW, SSB and RTTY. On the topic of RTTY, they hope to be a little different to many DXpeditions and have a solid focus on maximizing their RTTY QSO count by having a dedicated full-time RTTY station on the air from start to finish.

They'll also be QRV in the CQ World Wide DX CW contest with a multi-two entry.

Both the Wake Island and T33A DXpeditions are progressing nicely. We should hear them on the air in the September thru November time frame.

The Wake Atoll commemorative team's operation at the beginning of October, 2013 is progressing nicely.

The initial phase of the operation, planning, is essentially complete and the Team has moved into equipment procurement and staging operations. The equipment will be pre-staged in California and Hawaii prior to transport to Wake. Staging, pre-testing, packing, and shipping under the direction of Tom, ND2T and Kimo, KH7U are major undertakings for DXpeditions and are essential to assure equipment arriving on-time and safely on Wake.

T33A reports that May through July 2013 we will be acquiring equipment, testing and integrating stations and antennas.

August and September 2013 we will be closely monitoring the location of the equipment being shipped via sea container from California to Tarawa via New Zealand and Fiji.

In November 2013 our team members arrive on Fiji by the 1st, and fly to Tarawa early on November 3rd to begin our sea voyage later that evening. We arrive at Banaba early on the 5th, meet with locals, inspect planned sites, unload the boat and get 1-2 stations on the air by late evening.

Contesting

It's time for the "BIG ONE" – the Texas QSO Party (1400Z, Sep 28 to 2000Z, Sep 29). This annual NARS sponsored contest is one of the most active QSO parties in North America. Hams from around the State and from surrounding States converge on Texas to rack up points in mobile competition. Do you have the latest CQ/X? Is your mobile gear ready? Do you have a plan? If not then it's time to get it together and do some mobile contesting.

The sponsor of the CQ World Wide DX Contest has completely rewritten the contest rules, effective with this fall's SSB and CW weekends (RTTY is not affected). "The CQ WW DX Contest rules have evolved for over 50 years," said Contest Manager Randy Thompson, K5ZD, in announcing the updates July 1. "Changes in technology, operating practices and enforcement efforts caused the rules to become increasingly complex." The primary goal of the rewrite, he said, was "to make the rules simpler and easier to understand." The rewrite already has generated considerable online discussion. One change offers a "Classic Overlay" category for single-operator, all-band entries. "The Classic Overlay category is intended for the radio purists who want to participate in the most traditional way," Thompson explained. Entrants will use a single radio and operate without outside assistance, and only the first 24 hours of actual operating time will count toward the operator's score. Also new is a "Rookie Overlay" category for operators licensed 3 years or less. The CQ WW is doing away with the "Xtreme Contesting" and "Team Competition" categories, and "Checklog" is now listed as a noncompetitive entry category. The rewrite creates two categories of Club Competition — US and DX. Entrants must log contacts as they occur and may not edit their logs after the contest ends. The updated rules also address "unsportsmanlike conduct," such as having an excessive bandwidth, and disqualifications. "Red and Yellow cards have been removed in favor of one action disqualification," Thompson noted. The SSB event takes place October 26-27, the CW event November 23-24.

"Oh, how time flies...."

Very few of us can recall the arrival of communications via wire. It began, of course, with the arrival of Morse code and soon communications and the railroad put the pony express out of business. It wasn't long before wireless communications took hold. Public radio stations came into being along with ship to ship communications and proved to be the norm at the turn of the century. Radio equipment came to be the thing to have then. Receivers were then developed for home use and although cumbersome in weight and complexity, they provided entertainment for the masses never experienced before.

Then came the Great War, otherwise now known as WW1. As crude as aircraft were then, they began to find their place in history. It took a lot of glue and fabric to build a biplane in those days and it took a pilot with guts and plenty of long under-ware to fly that craft. Weight was a problem and with all that cold weather gear, you had to keep your weight down to a flyable level. About 1918, aircraft were used primarily for recon or for directing artillery fire. Wireless had great possibilities but it was new and the gunners/observers on a plane viewed it with disbelief and regarded it as a nuisance. All you needed was a pencil and pad of paper and you could draw out the data and fly back to the airdrome.

A great improvement came in 1915, with the introduction of the Sterling transmitter which weighed only twenty pounds and allowed the aircraft to carry an observer. The Sterling set was operated by a small key on the right-hand side of the observer's seat on which he tapped in Morse. For the set to work, a trailing aerial, 150 feet in length had to be unfurled from the aircraft.

S. S. Sanders: "On our aircraft we had an aerial – a piece of copper wire with a weight on it wound round a drum. When we wanted to call the battery (artillery), we dropped this down and hung it from the aircraft. Then with the aid of a Morse signal we were able to contact the battery. If they heard us distinctly they put out a white ground sheet." Uh, did I forget something? Communications was strictly one-way. Packing a receiver into a Vickers FB5 was just not possible due to the weight restrictions.

In May 1915, Major C. Prince sent the first spoken message from an aircraft to the ground. Despite the excitement it provided, wireless telephony was never applied to artillery observation. Spoken transmissions from loud, open cockpits might lead to misunderstandings and the changeover from the existing system in terms of equipment and training would have proved too complicated. In fact, a changeover from telegraphy to telephony was unnecessary, the existing system worked well, in spite of the difficulties faced by the airmen who were under near continual anti-aircraft fire, (known as Archie.")
